## **Beware**

Omission of state license numbers on signs, ads, contracts, proposals, letterheads, etc.


Requests for large deposits. Receipt of deposits should be for purchasing initial job materials.

Inability to provide references upon request.

Unmarked/privately owned vehicles.











## You should know that

Any alteration of your enclosure that could be considered a structural change should only be done by a **licensed contractor**.

This does include pool enclosure fastener change-outs, screen door replacement, pool enclosure gutter replacement, and guide wire replacement, to name a few. Removable-type windows such as soft vinyl, or acrylic/glass windows & window replacement are also considered structural alterations, as are carports and screen porches, and should only be performed by a licensed contractor.
